# THE YEAR FOR LIVER

It is shocking to realise that I have been the VP of Hepatology for a whole year. It has been a very interesting 12 months, and I am still honoured to be in this position.

Time moves so swiftly and of course all of the BSG roles must fit in amongst busy hospital jobs and home life. I would imagine working in a DGH is no different to working in a larger tertiary centre; the dedicated commitment to service from the staff is the same and the volume of workload proportional. It is the similar strains on the system that gives the liver section the need to look at hepatology as a whole, and the workforce saga impacts ability in everything.

This year, the liver section has been working on several guidelines on outpatients and on workforce. Though staffing shortages are felt throughout the NHS, it does feel like liver disease is where more needs to be done the soonest. Being VP has the advantage of being at the front of new ideas and progression, and being asked to sit on a huge variety of committees and represent the liver community of the BSG.

Some of the highlights, or low lights, from this year: The NCEPOD report 'Remeasuring the Units' looked at our national outcomes from alcohol misuse. Sadly, this did not show any improvement in outcomes for liver patients over the last 10 years. More recently, the disappointing lack of alcohol minimum pricing in England when our colleagues in the devolved nations are seeing a reduction in alcohol harm from new policies. Most recently from the BSG, <u>a statement</u> supporting

The only way forward for liver medicine is to empower the workforce, from early disease detection projects to wardbased care from specialist staff all of our colleagues that may have been touched by the hepatitis C blood scandal, and to acknowledge the suffering it has caused.

The BSG has continued to do what it does best; offer open access education and guideline materials, support members in all ways possible, and listen to concerns with ideas on how to take problems forward as well as what works well. But the only way forward for liver medicine is to empower the workforce, from early disease detection projects

to ward-based care from specialist staff. Most recently, the debate on Physician Associates has had us all engaged and the prompt BSG statements have been reassuring that the evolving workforce landscape has not gone unnoticed. We completely support our trainees and nurses, but also acknowledge there is a burgeoning workforce crisis and that many departments will already have skilled PAs embedded in their service structure who are invaluable members of the team. There is no easy answer, we have signposted ways in which the voice of our members can be heard including GMC and RCP surveys, as well as

being willing to take on oversight of governance issues. PAs continue to be welcome in our forums.

With the robust international standing of the BSG, we continue to work as one group in liver disease, embracing all of our members with an open-door policy, so that everyone is seen and heard. We need to continue to stand together, to hear everyone, not only to endure as a progressive society, but also as part of our constitution – to improve the health of the nation.

## THANK YOU TO EVERYONE WHO ATTENDED BSG LIVE'24

We would like to say a huge thank you to everyone who helped create and attended <u>BSG LIVE'24</u> on 17th – 20th June at the ICC in Birmingham.

As the premier and most extensive assembly of professionals from the UK GI Community, we hosted over 2,600 healthcare experts in this significant four-day scientific event. With a delegation comprising of physicians, surgeons, pathologists, radiologists, scientists, nurses, dieticians, undergraduates, and other dedicated individuals specialising in gastroenterology and hepatology, BSG LIVE is the definitive annual gathering for all those involved in this field.

BSG LIVE'24 featured the return of Monday Masterclass, an opening Plenary featuring keynotes and awarded lectures from leaders within the specialty, as well as more than 60 specialist scientific symposia. This year, we ran a seventh stream of sessions with more symposia on Research, as well as new symposia on NETS, "Gastroenterology in the Next 5 Years", GI Pathology, and an additional Sustainability session.

It was striking to see a new generation of gastroenterology and hepatology leaders and speakers dominate the programme. The conference went incredibly well and we were fully sold out for the first time in BSG history. The atmosphere was fantastic, as was the feedback following numerous people coming up to us to tell us that it was the best BSG annual conference that they have been to, and the quality of the talks was extremely high.

This year we saw the successful return of Pathology, had the biggest EndoVillage ever over 3 days, as well as a very popular undergraduate reception also attended by some of our BSG Officers. We worked as a Society and with our industry partners and conference organisers to build on key strategic themes of BSG like Equality, Diversity, and Inclusion, and Sustainability.

The BSG is committed to supporting and promoting environmental sustainability across all aspects of its practice nationally and internationally, and to supporting the NHS in its aims to achieve a net zero service. We are delighted to have delivered our most sustainable conference yet. Some of our key achievements this year was minimal conference materials produced, city centre location with good public transport and walkable social events, only vegetarian food served on two event days, no single use plastics throughout





the venue and dedicated water stations, tracking the impact of the event with questions on delegate travel, partnership with Event Cycle to redistribute items purchased for the family room to a local charity and will upcycle and redistribute other materials.

From our experience in sessions, we felt the conference was inclusive and dynamic. It was striking to see a new generation of gastroenterology and hepatology leaders and speakers dominate the programme, and many people remarked on that and found that to be positive and optimistic. We hope to continue to build on this in BSG LIVE'25, save the date for SEC, Glasgow on 23rd – 26th June 2025!

As you know, it takes a huge number of people to deliver something as large as our conference from the many speakers, chairs and EndoVillage trainers, the TFI Lodestar conference team and our own BSG team. We are talking hundreds of people and it's all those people, the BSG committees, and yourselves that made BSG LIVE'24 a success. We know a huge amount of effort and thought goes into developing and delivering educational



programmes and without that work to form the heart of the conference, it would not be the success it has been.

## **A MESSAGE FROM THE TRAINEES CHAIR**

It is a huge privilege to chair the BSG Trainees section, and I owe a great deal to my predecessors for their work to date. I have big shoes to fill!

Of late, we have been busy responding to training concerns raised by our colleagues. Many of you will have seen the letter sent to organisations involved in speciality training which highlighted key areas of concern. These included the impact of service provision upon gastroenterology training, and the difficulties accessing endoscopy training including upper GI bleed training. We are grateful for the responses from the <u>JRCPTB</u>, <u>BSG</u>, Gastroenterology and IM SAC, and remain committed to working with stakeholders to find pragmatic solutions to these issues. Amid the NHS workforce crisis, a huge proportion of senior trainees are choosing not to accept substantive consultant posts as they CCT. Combined with the prediction that 50% of the current consultant workforce will retire within the next decade, this projects as a rather concerning void in our workforce. We must ensure that senior trainees are confident and competent when making the transition into consultancy and put simply; feel confident they must be trained adequately. The 2024 BSG National Trainee Survey will provide us with a better understanding of the barriers to achieving this.

Our survey will also tell us more about our trainee workforce, and about how barriers disproportionally

Firstly, we know that whilst currently 20% work flexibly, 44% of trainees look to do so in the future. The majority (90%) of flexible workers are women but importantly, requests from men are increasing also. At first glance, flexible working challenges both traditional training and workforce models. However, given the burnout and attrition rates within gastroenterology, flexible working presents an opportunity to optimise retention and shape what future sustainable working looks like. Secondly, female medical students continue to outnumber their male counterparts at approximately 55%. The number of UK female trainees is increasing, yet only 24% of UK gastroenterology and hepatology consultants are female. Within my working lifetime, I hope these percentages will align and I look forward to working with the gastroenterology community to remove the glass ceilings that clearly still exist, to make our specialty appealing and accessible to everyone.

Finally, some lighter material - a busy programme of events. Our education course and management and leadership events will again run in the week to safeguard precious weekend downtime. Our taster events are aimed at FY and IMT trainees, but our faculty often comment how uplifting it is to be in a room buzzing with enthusiasm for our speciality in which there is always plenty to be excited about. We look forward to seeing you at some of these events.

The annual conference of the British Society of Gastroenterology, BSG LIVE'24, was absolutely packed with the best quality of education that was bigger and better than ever before and can rival any other international meeting in the world.

It was all about education, research, and training at BSG LIVE, and I hope you managed to attend the Education Committee's Mentoring Workshop on Wednesday morning. If you missed any of these exciting sessions, you can <u>catch up on-demand</u> until 8th August.

Behind the scenes, the Education Team has been very active in the last few months. Two of our associate online web education Editors, Dr John Ong and Dr Srivathsan Ravindran, have completed their term and we have successfully appointed two new online associate Editors, Dr Jennifer Tham and Dr Eather Shakweh, who have already started delivering some collaborative education with the Royal College of Physicians. The Web Education team led by my Co-Chair, Dr Roisin Bevan and Dr Navjyot (Jyoti) Hansi have been producing web articles on a regular basis – they have released 2 new videos in January 2024, a new Journal Highlights article on the 'Diagnosis and management of functional dyspepsia', and a top tips video on "How to get a Gastroenterology number".

# **BSG RESEARCH UPDATE**

It is with great pleasure that I take over the helm as the first female and Academic Hepatologist Chair of the BSG Research Committee in June 2024. I would like to begin by sincerely thanking Shaji Sebastian for leading the Committee through a very challenging 2 years as UK Gastroenterology reemerged from the covid pandemic.

Research is fundamental to every aspect of medicine, regardless of academic discipline, clinical speciality, locality, or level of practice. Since the NHS was founded in 1948, it has gained an international acclaimed reputation for outstanding biomedical and clinical research contribution. This is underpinned by the fundamental belief that patients should receive not only the best care that is currently available, but to aspire to delivering even better care in the future. Furthermore, it is recognised that patients enrolled in clinical trials have better outcomes than those who are not.

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I believe that it is possible to integrate clinical care and research into the NHS. That said, the Covid-19 pandemic has created unprecedented challenges for research and innovation. The onus has been on catching up clinically, clearing backlogs against a backdrop of industrial action in an adverse financial climate with reduced charitable and research council funding. We need to rejuvenate a disenfranchised, disengaged, and 'burnt out' workforce.

It is therefore vital to identify clear realistic strategic priorities in partnership with patients, carers, clinicians, external partners, and charitable bodies. So, what part can the BSG play in the integration of clinical care and research? Research has been at the heart of the BSG since its inception. 15,000 patients have been recruited to UK-led endoscopy trials in the last 5 years. The BSG Research Strategy 2021-24 will be key to this and builds upon the work done over recent years identifying key strategic priorities for the 7 Clinical Research Groups (CRGs):

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- Endoscopy
- Liver
- IBD
- Food and Function
- Pancreas
- Al Task Force
- Gut Microbiota for Health

So, what do I see as our strategic research priorities for 2024-25? We need to support our members in participating in research and continue to define the research priorities

> in collaboration with the James Lind Alliance: a collaborative effort that involves patients, carers, scientists, clinicians, and allied health professionals. Specifically, we need to support the delivery of the NIHR-funded Gastroenterology and Hepatology portfolio which includes pivotal clinical trials that are driving the global research agenda.

To overcome some of these barriers, the BSG has introduced the BSG Research Scholars Scheme which enables financial support and mentorship to research active clinicians and allied health professionals

to carve out time to dedicate to pursuing research. I am keen to publicise and expand this scheme in the coming years. We are also proud to see that many BSG trainees have also joined the NIHR Associate Principal Investigator Scheme that will train our clinical research leaders of the future which has been bolstered by the incredibly productive Trainee Research Networks who continue to tackle some of the key clinical research questions. Finally, it has been wonderful to witness the growing engagement of our Allied Health Professionals in clinical research including pharmacists, nurses, physiotherapists, occupational therapists, and dieticians. It is the intention of the Research Committee to continue to mentor and support the delivery of research at the very heart of the BSG.

# **BSG TRAINING UPDATE**

It is a cliché but time flies! Almost a year since my appointment as deputy chair of the Training Committee, writing this piece has allowed time for reflection on a very busy 12 months.

Very early on, I was delighted to attend the Strategy Day which provided a wonderful opportunity to meet with other members of the BSG, learn about what other committees are doing, and contribute to the future strategy plan.

One of my first 'big' events was the National Introduction to Gastroenterology day held in Birmingham in November 2023 which Simon Panter (Chair of the Training Committee) and I planned and hosted. We were delighted to welcome 40 delegates at the IET (Institution of Engineering and Technology). The face-toface event provided a much-welcomed opportunity for those new to higher specialty training to network and meet some inspirational people within the specialty. The programme included sessions on the Shape of Gastroenterology training, Hepatology over the next 4 years, the SCE, why we love the many subspecialties within Gastroenterology and many other topics. We received excellent feedback from the delegates and are currently planning the next event.

I was pleased to be a part of the judging panel of the Barbers Company Award. This is an award of £3000 to contribute to a project that helps patient care through clinical service delivery. We received 9 excellent applications. I am delighted that Dr Theresa Hydes (a Merseybased HST) was the successful candidate and her project aims to support those with metabolic associated liver disease.

The face-to-face event provided a much-welcomed opportunity for those new to higher specialty training to network and meet some inspirational people within the specialty. The Training Committee is also involved in assisting with judging the Dame Parveen Kumar Award for Education and Training. The applicants are nominated by the trainees in recognition of their contribution to Education and Training. We received 32 applications to a very high standard and the winner was Dr Sarah Clark, Consultant Hepatologist, St George's Hospital London. Sarah received her award at BSG LIVE in June 2024, attended the President's dinner at the conference, will receive £1,000 towards an educational project of her choice, and was invited to join the BSG Training Committee as an associate member for one year. There were also two highly

commended nominees, Dr Louise China, Consultant Hepatologist, Royal Free London Hospital, and Dr Phedra Dodds, Nurse Lead, NHS England South West Endoscopy Programme.

Recognising the importance of collaborative working, I have also been involved in a working group supporting Dr Charlie Andrews (GP) to produce a framework to support GPwER in Gastroenterology. The Training Committee members suggested some changes to the final document. Once completed, the framework will be presented to the BSG Executive and Council for their consideration of approval at their meeting in September 2024.

I continue to work with the trainees and recently appointed consultants on the newly established New Consultants Group within the committee to support those transitioning to consultant roles. I was thrilled that within the first few months of the group, we were able to deliver a session at the BSG annual meeting which was received positively. I look forward to the next 12 months!
